The Board of Directors of Central Georgia EMC announced a capital credit refund to electric consumers who received service during 1997 and 1998. The refund checks were mailed to customers on December 2, 2016.

The total amount of this refund was \$2,392,988.97, which represents the remaining margins for 1997 and a majority of the margins for 1998. The margins are used as capital until they can be returned through a general refund without impairing the cooperative's financial condition. Capital credits are a benefit of your membership.

A New Look: LED Outdoor Lighting

Central Georgia EMC's new light-emitting diode (LED) outdoor lighting offers brilliant illumination for an affordable monthly rate. LED outdoor lights provide an even light distribution, and have a longer life span than traditional lighting.

LED lights are different from other lighting sources such as incandescent bulbs and CFLs. They are solid in nature and do not contain any gases or filaments. LEDs are ideal for outdoor use because they are resistant to vibrations and exposure to weather, wind, and rain. They are temperature resistant and operate well in cold outdoor temperatures that can affect the operation of other lights.

Key LED differences:

- **Light source:** Light-emitting diodes are the size of pepper flecks. A mix of red, green, and blue LEDs produces crisp white light.
- **Direction:** LEDs emit light in a specific direction, reducing the need for reflectors and diffusers that can trap light. This feature makes LEDs more efficient than other types of lighting, in which the light must be reflected in the desired direction and more than half of the light may never leave the fixture.
- **Heat:** LEDs emit very little heat. In comparison, incandescent bulbs release 90 percent of their energy as heat and CFLs release about 80 percent of their energy as heat. LEDs are safer and more efficient.
- **Life span:** Known for their longevity and efficiency, LED lights have an estimated operational life span of up to 50,000 hours. LEDs can operate continuously for 17 years, reducing long-term maintenance.

Residential Service Rate Adjustment Now in Effect

In November, Central Georgia EMC informed you of a service charge rate revision effective with member billings that begin January 1, 2017. CGEMC's residential service charge has adjusted to \$22 per month from \$19. This moves the residential service charge closer to the true cost of service for residential customer-owners.

Currently, more than 69 percent of CGEMC's revenue goes to purchasing power. Another 13 percent covers fixed charges such as taxes, interest, and depreciation. That leaves 18 percent to cover expenses associated with the cost of service.

Even with this adjustment to the service charge, Central Georgia EMC remains one of the lowest-cost electric utilities in the state. Customer-owners may compare current residential rates online at the Georgia Public Commission website: www.psc.state.ga.us/electric/surveys/residentialrs.asp.



Banana Oatmeal Cookies From the kitchen of

Ingredients:

1/4 cup shortening

1 stick butter

1 cup sugar

1/2 cup brown sugar (packed)

1 large egg

1 teaspoon vanilla

1 1/4 cups all-purpose flour

1/2 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon cinnamon

1 teaspoon baking soda

1 cup mashed ripe bananas

1/2 cup raisins

1/2 cup chopped pecans

3 1/4 cups quick cooking oats

Directions:

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Mix shortening, butter, sugar. Add egg, banana, and vanilla. Mix dry ingredients, flour, salt, cinnamon, and baking soda. Add dry ingredients to wet ingredients, mixing well. Fold in oats, raisins, and nuts.

Drop by teaspoon on greased baking sheet, one inch apart. Bake 12-15 minutes, removing from baking sheet immediately to cool. Yields five dozen cookies.

The Power to Pay your Way: **Prepaid Metering**

Prepaid metering gives you the power to pay when you want in the amounts you want. Instead of receiving a paper bill each month, electricity use is calculated daily.

Keeping up with your energy use and account balance is easy; you can choose to receive daily notifications with our smartphone app, by email, or by text message.

Think of prepaid metering as similar to your car's gas tank. You "prepay" for gasoline when you fill up your tank. With prepaid metering, you pay for your electricity before use. When your account balance is nearing empty, you simply make a payment.
